

How to Make a Snow Globe

Tools and materials

You will need:

- almost any jar,
- plastic or ceramic figurines -available at flea markets and hobby shops,
 - bottlebrush trees-available at many floral-supply stores,
 - oil-based enamel paint,
 - sandpaper,
 - epoxy,
 - distilled water,
 - glitter,
- glycerin-available at drugstores.

How to make



- If the jar lids are not in seasonal colors already, first paint them with oil-based enamel paint.
- Sand the inside of the lid until the surface is rough. With clear-drying epoxy, adhere your chosen figurine to the inside of the lid, and let the epoxy dry.
- Fill the jar almost to the top with distilled water; add a pinch of glitter and a dash of glycerin to keep the glitter from falling too quickly.
- Screw on the lid tightly, being careful not to dislodge the figurine. Turn the jar over and back again—and let it snow.

Conclusions, recommendations or wishes.

- In conclusion, it is fairly easy to make a snowglobe cheaply and with fairly household items, although mine wasn't very pretty because I didn't have the necessary materials, so I improvised and replaced some of the materials with similar materials.
